The match for the Terry Lewins Trophy was on a more autumnal day than the previous 2 matches. In the week leading to the match, 2 clubs had phoned to say that they probably would be unable to field a team -West 4 AC and Chiltern Running Club. However, we still had about 70 runners, mingling with the assorted 250 odd cadets, directing staff and others at the start. Unfortunately, 4 runners from Orion missed the start and set out a few minutes late. Only to discover that the gate out to the main part of the course had been locked behind the runners. Only a gentle, self-generated jog in the beautiful surroundings and the superb match tea went some way to mollify their frustrations with the traffic on the M25 and the Army. Huw Jenkins had organised what was described to me later as "the most enjoyable course" they had experienced at Sandhurst. The enjoyment was muted a bit by the weather, with a vicious squall of torrential rain tearing through the area about half an hour after the start. # Feltham Puffers' River Relay September 1994

Just to be different Feltham Puffer unwound the repetitive lappery of the conventional relay race and laud the legs end to end between Virginia Water and Richmond. What a course resulted; through parks, along the Thames bank in and out of the traffic; gradients were very few, but all else was variety, including the leg lengths which ranged from 3.7 to nearly 8 miles.

As at Windsor, we had 2 entries, each easily meeting the requirements of a least 1 lady and 2 Vets per team. Again, we loaded as much talent as could be found into the A team and with it all the expectations of success, leaving the B team to enjoy the route and admire the scenery.

The seeding was well justified by the results, the A team coming 10th out of 40 teams, in 3 hours 15 minutes and 40 seconds, beating the B's into 25th place where they were pretty chuffed to find they were only 17 minutes behind in 3 hours 32 minutes and 14 seconds. It is probably invidious to pick out individual performances, so here goes! Steve Finch, as ever, showed he rates in any company by being the 2nd fastest on the last leg, John Gilroy had a storming run on leg 4 to record 4th fastest and lift his team 8 places, 5th fastest was Ian Ward, improving the B Team's standing by 4 places: Nik Wood, opening the race for the Milos A, handed over in 5th place and perhaps would have gone quicker had he realised that his Dad was only 1 minute 18 seconds behind in 9th place.

It was a very good day for all concerned; well done the runners and thank you for taking part. It demands something of an act of faith to turn up at the start of your leg, park your car, leave your kit and run anything up to 8 miles away in the fond expectation that, somehow, you, your kit and your car will be reunited. 
