HALF TERM REPORT By Neil Wood

The first half of the season was a fairly typical Milo mixture; some familiar faces were absent, some returned and there were some new arrivals too. The year began and ended with success, but was patchy in between, nevertheless, turn outs were encouraging and the league performance saw us with sufficient points after two rounds to be in touch with the top 10, which is about where we belong. On balance, we made progress and finished 1997 by turning out the strongest side in recent memory, at Ranelagh.

Undoubtedly, the highlight of the first half was retaining "our" Terry Lewins trophy, in the opening race of the season: outstanding individual performances were produced by Tim Jones at both Sandhurst and Ranelagh. In the home match he left the field standing and won by over 90 seconds, whereas in the Ellis Trophy he had to be content with a close second, but that was not bad for a vet! Every bit as exciting as Tim's run at Ranelagh was the depth and quality of our 20-strong side: it was virtually the dream team, lacking only Jerry Greeves (abroad) and Roger Clark (injured) to have made it full strength. It was still not strong enough to beat Serpentine, who packed their 10 to score into the first 18 places; nevertheless, we were second, ahead of Stragglers, Hercules, Ranelagh and others, our last qualifier being 72nd out of 170 runners. We did very well in fast company.

Other club matches were not quite so successful, but produced some heartening individual performances. Nick Wood took his first win for the club, against Kingston and Poly and was well backed up by Nick Amy in 4th and Howard Long 8th: sadly the senior citizens could not keep up and we lost that one. Whenever Kevin Dyer turns out for us he is highly competitive and he completed a 4, 5, 6 finish, at Orion, behind Nicks Wood and Amy. By forming a composite team with East London Triathletes, who had some pretty nifty runners themselves, we managed to come second to Orion out of 5 clubs, so the young ones' efforts were not entirely diluted by the 4 father-figures puffing round at the back.

At last. After an eternity during which Orion's tea room was next to the Showers and the changing rooms up a flight of stairs and at the far end of the building, alterations have been made to bring changing and showering next door to each other: this is progress!

Only 4 of us at Thames represented a forlorn hope against the host club's battalions, nevertheless, Nick Amy salvaged some Milo honour by coming 7th and the rest of us took good advantage of the opportunity to grab some club points while the real runners were missing: Thames won that one.

Among the club excursions was the serious business of league racing. We are habitually slow starters in this arena, obliging ourselves to catch up during the remainder of the season. As we always seem to finish comfortably in the top half of the rankings, it is intriguining to speculate how well we might do were we to give ourselves a better start. Of course the league is all about numbers, the 10 to score and the scores they make and this year we fielded our 10 in both of the 1997 races. At a rain swept Gadebridge round Nick Wood scored his best league finish in 7th and some good packing in the middle of the field produced a respectable score, placing us 13th and keeping us in touch with the pack. In mild weather, at Kingsbury, we got into our stride and were 5th; we lacked a front runner, but 4 scorers in the first 50 and 7 within the hundred piled up the points. Bob Green, a new face, was a strong 19th on a course for the sprinters and Nick Amy finished 52nd having started late as the field disappeared from view. By the end of the year our league position had improved to 11th out of 19 and 3 teams ahead of us were all within reach.

In the Club Championship there is all to play for in the second half: Nick Amy and the secretary have 113 points, Nick Wood 97 and Mike Wilson 92 and those 4 are by no means out of sight. Good luck in '98.

1997/1998 SEASON, THE SECOND HALF By Neil Wood

Of late, our cross-country seasons seem to have faded away, after Christmas with fewer fixtures, fewer faces appearing and that yawning gap, in March, when everything seems to go quiet, before one final bash at the Bank. And 97/98 was no exception, so useful suggestions would be welcome as to what we can do to ginger up the second half, in future. Perhaps, for a start, we could revive the handicap.

The new year started encouragingly enough with the 3rd round of the league, a welcome appearance from Gerry Greeves, who took 3rd overall and 8 runners who, between them, claimed 8th place. And things looked to be improving when we raised a full team of 10 and 2 extra for round 4: getting 7 of the side into the first 100 helped us to 792 points and 8th place again. Nick Wood led the team in 12th and Nick Amy in 32nd only just saw off Ian Greenhalgh in 36th.

Another dozen turned out at the Bank and it was good to see Ian Jebson back and Simon Wheeler, both of whom ran very well. Ian Greenhalgh was first Milo, in 10th and he was well backed up by Dave Edwards, Simon Wheeler, Ian Jebson, Ted Leath and Ian Johnston, in the first half of the field. Sadly, the senior citizens could not provide the support to capitalise on the youngsters' efforts and we were beaten into 3rd place by strong Hercules and Ranelagh teams - but we beat the Bank.

Only Simon, Bert and I went to BA, the day after the Bank race and racked up some Club points while nobody was looking. Simon took away the prize for first guest runner and seemed none the worse for races on consecutive days: Bert and I suffered on his behalf.

Then it was the short one at Ranelagh which seemed to suit Dave Edwards who managed a storming 5th and was closely followed, in 7th, by Howard Long making (yet another) welcome comeback. He can't sing like Sinatra, but Sinatra was probably no runner. Again, the remaining 5 of us fought among ourselves for the Club points but did not cause Hercules, Ranelagh and Ealing much concern. Nevertheless, we beat the Bank again.

League 5 is always at Banbury - the longer the season goes on the further away the league fixtures seem to be. We could only raise 6 runners and alright, I didn't run because of some pathetic excuse about a damaged finger, but some of the other teams seemed less than enthused too and the field, at just over 100, was about half its normal size. Nick Wood rounded off a successful league season with 14th place and Howard Long and Simon Wheeler backed him strongly in 23rd and 55th. The senior citizens, Brendan and Mikes Wilson and Sumpter all contributed to the cause and proved the necessity for numbers rather than talent, in league races: if you finish you score points, which you cannot do if you are not there on the day. At the end of this year's league campaign we finished 10th in the seniors and 12th in the vets, out of 19 teams and Nick Wood was 6th overall in the senior men's rankings. To my chargin, had I not whimped out of the Banbury race with my finger, I would probably have been 3rd in the over 50s. I know; 'serves me right'.

And finally, it was back to the Bank where 7 stalwarts, led by Nick in 2nd and Howard Long in 6th, took on Blackheath, Waverley and the Bank and once again the Bank got the sticky end of it. It is always reassuring to know that there is somebody worse off than yourself.

Well that should have been the end of it, but next day Nick won the Tough 10: what it is to be young! Had there been a father and son category, we would have won that too and it was good to see Andrew and Deborah Reynolds, Ted Leath and Brendan and Pat Cradden there flying the Milocarian colours. Well done everybody!

BRUSSELS 20KM - 17 MAY 1998 By Neil Wood

Like most big city races, nothing much changes in the Brussels 20km, except the weather. This year was my fourth race and we were due a hot one, which was what we got.

Start positions for the race go on past form and with a sub 2,000 number out of 14,000 entrants I was well up with the club runners. This has the advantage of allowing a quick getaway, but the downside is less sense of progress against the field, because you are running among people of a very similar standard. There was further evidence of the front of the field knowing what it was about in that, despite the heat, there were few casualties to be seen; further back the dropout rate was fairly high.

The organisers managed to cock-up the start, surprising everybody by letting off the "go-banger" while the Belgian National Anthem was still playing. It made no difference overall; the elites got away in front and returned in what seemed to be an indecently short time later, led by the usual gaggle of wraith like Africans. Odoro Osoro (who he?) won in 55:15 and imagine what the winning time would have been if one of the well known Kenyans had entered!

For the rest of us, further back, there was the novelty of having plenty of supportive spectators around the route and the stimulus provide by a large competitive field. Also, there were the inevitable small incidents that stick in the mind. This year's favourite was the sight of a trio of smartly dressed elderly women trying to cross the main route of the race on a pedestrian crossing and obviously very indignant that the field would not stop for them! Also, I felt very sorry for the pipe band, in full regalia and all that heat and wondered whether they would melt before they exploded.

Normally, I feel that running on roads is unnatural and attempting anything beyond about 6 miles, rash beyond reason, however, the Brussels 20km is a race I always enjoy - particularly as each year I have been quicker than the last. But, this year I think I overdid it and improved by nearly 4 minutes which means that lowering my time further, next year, is going to present something of a challenge; but I shall be there, nevertheless and more of you should join Margaret and I and Pat and Brendan for what is always an enjoyable mixture of reunion, running and relaxation.
